

Southeast Asia

In this summer edition of the 18.26 Network Newsletter, we will feature a family who lives in Taiwan, a country with numerous Buddhist and pagan temples, where Christianity accounts for only a small portion of the population. Taiwan* is part of our **Southeast Asia region** (see map). This region has the second largest number of 18.26 Network missionaries with Japan accounting for nearly 70% of our vocational missionaries in Southeast Asia.

Local Church and Work Outreach

Baptisms! A mother and her two sons were baptized just before Easter! Praise the Lord! The church continues to rebuild and extend love to the local community. Through a coffee ministry and multiple English classes on the weekends, lives are brought into the orbit and love of Christ's body here. As a side note, we are the closest church (proximity-wise) to the Military headquarters, and we pray to have a gospel impact on the members of the Armed Services here.

"We are really praying that as para-church missionaries, we can help the church in Taiwan heal internally and be knit together in the love of Jesus."


We've also started a little Sunday school/preschool time for the kids during the main sermon. We are covering the essential Bible stories during the main sermon, and returning to worship together with the adults. Our class is tiny, with our tiny three and two other boys (who were just baptized!)

At the work front, I teach three weekly English Bible studies that seek to upbuild and to evangelize students of all ages and walks of life. It is a joy to "dine" on God's Word and watch it renew hearts! In our media ministry, we continue to dedicate time to running a small YouTube channel designed to use English learning to teach the Bible. The season has also begun where we prepare a theater show for Christmas outreach and run several kids camps.

New Print Ministry



Irene and I have finished a new English-learning gospel magazine. It is a "coffee table" magazine designed to draw Chinese-speaking English students into contact with the Word of God! So far we have distributed around 6,000 free copies throughout Taiwan, and the demand keeps growing! The goal is to provide an outreach devotional magazine that is BOLD about Christ and full of joy, beauty AND English learning! This may sound odd, but the response has been quite positive.
